

PE and Sport Premium Report 2025-25

Felton Church of England Primary School

Overview

The PE and Sport Premium provides funding to help primary schools improve the quality of physical education, physical activity and sport provision. This report outlines how Felton Church of England Primary School allocated its funding for the **2024–2025 academic year**, the impact of this investment, and how we are ensuring long-term sustainability.

1. PE and Sport Premium Spending Summary

Total PE and Sport Premium Spent: £16,800

This funding was used across three key areas:

- **CPD (Staff Training and Professional Development): £8,450**
 - **Internal Activities: £6,000**
 - **External Activities: £2,350**
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2. Breakdown of Spending

A. Staff CPD (Professional Development) — £8,450

Investments were made to improve staff confidence, skills and knowledge in delivering high-quality PE and sport.

Funding supported pupils' participation in wider sporting networks.

3. Targeted Opportunities

The school allocated funding to support equitable access to sport and physical activity, including:

- **SEND pupils and those with long-term medical conditions**
(e.g. inclusive PE training, support for participation in competitions, peer-to-peer activity)
 - **Disadvantaged pupils**, ensuring equal access to a broad range of physical activities
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4. Impact of PE and Sport Premium Funding

The school reports **positive impact across all key areas**, including:

Staff Development

- Increased staff confidence in teaching PE and delivering high-quality sport provision
- Growth in staff participation in extra-curricular activities and school sport
- More staff completing specialist training and CPD

Pupil Engagement and Outcomes

- Improved pupil engagement in regular physical activity
- Increased participation in extra-curricular clubs and competitive sport
- Broader and more varied sports and physical activity opportunities
- Raised profile of PE and sport across the school
- Improvements in pupils' attainment in PE

Whole-School Impact

- Contribution to wider school improvement
- A stronger culture of physical activity and wellbeing

5. Sustainability

The funding has contributed to **long-term improvements**, including:

- Upskilling staff so high-quality teaching continues beyond the funded period
- Investment in resources and equipment that will benefit pupils for years ahead
- Strengthening partnerships with local sporting networks and organisations

Overall, improvements made through this funding are considered **sustainable** and embedded in the school's long-term provision.

6. Swimming and Water Safety Outcomes (Year 6)

All Year 6 pupils achieved the expected national curriculum outcomes:

Skill	% of Pupils Meeting Standard
Swim 25 metres confidently	100%
Use a range of strokes effectively	100%
Perform safe self-rescue	100%

The school did not identify a direct impact of PE premium spending on swimming outcomes this year due to already strong attainment.
